1. PURPOSE OF REPORT AND EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- 1.1 This report details the undertaking of the statutory consultation and its outcome on the Councils' proposals to introduce rapid electric vehicle charging points at the above locations
- 1.2 It seeks approval to implement the above recommendations.

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 Despite government grants, the uptake of battery electric (BEV) or Plug-in hybrid electric vehicles (PHEV) has been slower than originally anticipated. This slow take up has in part been due to higher purchase costs, the variety of vehicles available and range anxiety (the concern that a vehicle might run out of power during a journey). However, vehicle manufacturers are now offering a much-improved selection of electric/PHEV vehicles to customers.
- 2.2 The recent Society of Motor Manufactures and Traders (SMMT) data below shows a marked acceleration in the numbers of BEV and PHEV.

- 2.3 London is at the forefront of the zero-emission revolution with more than 20,000 electric vehicles, 1,700 electric taxis. Rapid chargers are specifically beneficial to high mileage users, such as taxis and commercial vehicles.
- 2.4 Transport for London has set a target to deliver 300 rapid charge stations across London, with the eventual aim of delivering 20 rapid charge stations per borough. There are current five rapid (50kw) chargers in Merton, sited on the Transport for London Road Network.
- 2.5 The Government has recently announced its intention to bring forward the ban on the sale of new petrol, diesel and hybrid cars to 2035 from 2040.
- 2.6 London introduced the Ultra Low Emission Zone in April 2019, with further proposals in place to widen it to the North and South Circular roads in 2021. All taxis and new Private Hire Vehicles (newly-licensed) will also be required to be zero emission capable (ZEC),
- 2.7 A key objective of the Mayor's Transport Strategy is to facilitate the delivery of a network of Electrical Vehicle Recharging Points (EVRPs) across London. This is reinforced by documents such as the London Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Delivery Plan
- 2.8 Following the formal announcement of a climate emergency. The Council is expected present an Action Plan to Cabinet in March 2020. The plan is likely to endorse an accelerated rollout of electric vehicle charging point infrastructure. This new plan will supplement the current air quality Action Plan.
- 2.9 Analysis undertaken by TfL suggests that by the end of 2025 London could need 2,300 4,100 rapid chargers, and 33,700 47,500 slow to fast chargers (3kw 7kw). Merton currently has around 143 fast (7kw) chargers and 5 rapid chargers (50Kw).
- 2.10 The Council has ambitions to ensure that rapid chargers serve all of its town centers.

3. CONSULTATION

- 3.1 Prior to a statutory consultation, the above locations did undergo the planning approval process. During the planning stage, there were objections for one of the sites. These objections subsequently addressed. The statutory consultation on the proposals was undertaken between the 23rd January and 21st February 2020.
- 3.2 The consultation included the erection of street notices on nearby lamp columns and the publication of the Council's intentions in the Local Guardian and the London Gazette. Notices were also distributed to property owners adjacent to the proposed charging points. Plans were made available at the Link, Merton Civic Centre and on the Council's website.
- 3.3 No objections to the proposals during the statutory consultation period were received.
- 3.4 Based on the public consultation responses, it is recommended that the TMO be made to implement both rapid chargers.

4. ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS

- 4.1 Do nothing. This would be contrary to the Supreme Court ruling that the government must take immediate action to cut air pollution after the UK breached EU limits for nitrogen dioxide (NO2) in the air. The Government is now legally bound to take urgent action.
- 4.2 There are several different approaches that the council could adopt to the provision of charging infrastructure including-
 - Purchase and maintain its own independent network of EVCP's
 - Form a partnership with another EVCP provider.
- 4.3 The Council's partnership approach offers the council best value at a low financial risk in a rapidly changing and innovative market place. Most boroughs no longer have the resources nor technical expertise to operate independently.

5. TIMETABLE

5.1 Following a decision to proceed with implementation of the proposed rapid charging points and publication of the Cabinet Member decision, the made traffic management orders usually follow within 6 weeks. This will include the erection of the notices on nearby lamp columns in the area, the publication of the made Orders in the Local Guardian and the London Gazette. The relevant documents will be made available at the Link, Civic Centre and on the Council's website. Installation will follow soon after.

6. FINANCIAL, RESOURCE AND PROPERTY IMPLICATIONS

- 6.1 Following a separate procurement process undertaken on behalf of the Council by TfL. The contract and licence has been awarded to Chargemaster Ltd, who will install, operate and maintain the equipment.
- 6.2 The contract will run for 8 years. Investment costs would be recovered through membership fees and user charges. "The charger would support pay as you go". The council responsibilities is limited to progressing the necessary Traffic Management Orders, enforcement and highway maintenance. The cost of providing the necessary power supply to the rapid charger will be met by Transport for London.

6.3 The cost of making the making the necessary traffic orders will be met from the Councils Local Implementation Plan budget.

7. LEGAL AND STATUTORY MPLICATIONS

- 7.1 The Traffic Management Orders would be made under Section 6 and Section 45 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 (as amended). The Council is required by the Local Authorities Traffic Order (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996 to give notice of its intention to make a Traffic Order (by publishing a draft traffic order). These regulations also require the Council to consider any representations received as a result of publishing the draft order.
- 7.2 The Council has discretion as to any decision to hold a public inquiry before deciding whether to make a traffic management order or to modify the published draft order. A public inquiry should be held where it would provide further information, which would assist the Council in reaching a decision.

8. HUMAN RIGHTS, EQUALITIES AND COMMUNITY COHESION IMPLICATIONS

- 8.1 The Council carries out careful consultation to ensure that all road users are given a fair opportunity to air their views and express their needs.
- 8.2 Bodies representing motorists, including commuters are included in the statutory consultation required for draft traffic management and similar orders.
- 8.3 The implementation of the proposal aims to assist those with existing and future needs.


- 10.1 The road safety implications/risks during installation and maintenance have been considered at each stage of the detailed design process.
- 10.1 The risk of not implementing the proposals would be detrimental to Council's obligations in addressing air quality and emerging climate change action plan




Appendix 1 - Drawing ELECT 001- 012 batch 5


