I am currently employed as a police licensing officer for the London Borough of Merton, I have been in this role
for approximately 10 years. I have been a police officer for 29 years and a Sergeant since 1996.
This witness statement is intended to assist the licensing sub-committee when considering the application for the
premises licence at Tasty Chicken Mitcham Ltd, 173 London Road, Mitcham. CR4 2JB and is supplementary to
my representations dated 23rd October 2013.
In my representations I have identified four(4) offences specifically linked to these premises I propose to examine
these offences in more detail.
1. 30/5/14 2250-2252 — Criminal Damage - Police were called to the premises where 3 males
entered the shop, apparently under the influence of drink and/or drugs, caused a disturbance before throwing
items at members of staff when asked to leave. They left the shop before smashing a number of window panels
when staff tried to close the shutters of the shop.
2.13/6/14 2110-2120 Attempted Robbery - Police were called to the premises where a male
had threatened members of staff and stated he was going to take the cash till.
3. 13/6/14 2115 Grievous Bodily Harm - This is linked to the above report, following the
altercation a member of staff at the premises threw boiling oil over the victim causing severe burns.
4. 4/8/14 2345 Criminal Damage - Police were called to the premises to a male causing a
disturbance. The premises were in the process of closing and refused him service. The male then became abusive
and urinated over the floor and shutters of the premises. When approached by police officers he was abusive and
spat at them.
It is of note that of these offences there is only one that took place at a time when a premises licence would be in
force, however, in each case those involved were under the influence of alcohol. If the premises are granted a

I am the Sector Inspector responsible for Policing across the Mitcham area within the London Borough of Merton.
Over the last 18 months police have responded to a significant increase in anti-social behaviour across Mitcham Sector and
particularly in the vicinity of Mitcham Town Centre and Figges Marsh. This increase is one of the highest within the greater
London area. These incidents are not specific in their type or nature but cover the whole spectrum of anti-social behaviour
from winating in the street up to and including attempted murder. Upon researching the issues it identified that a large
percentage of these crimes were committed by a small group of individuals, approximately 10. These suspects are embedded
either directly or indirectly in a cycle of anti-social behaviour that impacts on them, their families and most of all the wider
communities.
Residents are afraid to venture into the area due to the problems caused by these individuals; the area is covered in dropped
alcohol containers, smells strongly of urine, drunken persons lying/slumped on the ground/benches. Members of the public
complain that they are sworn at, threatened and accosted by these individuals, residents are now actively moving away from
the area Shop-keepers complain that their actions are driving customers away from the area which is impacting on business.
Most of these suspects live within in a short distance of where they commit their behaviour.
In an effort to control/prevent some of this behaviour a Controlled Drinking Zone, was implemented across the Borough in
July 2013. This has been partially successful and its enforcement has sent out a strong message to a wide section of the
community. However the persistent hardcore offenders have ignored this zone.

Due to the epidemic proportions that the crime has reached, Merton Police have had to dedicate 4 officers specifically to tackle this issue. This thereby removes these officers from their other responsibilities. Due to this abstraction of staff this has hindered our ability to respond to emergency calls, conduct community engagements and investigate the most serious crimes.

This is in addition to the increasing financial burden placed on the Police with Merton Borough having has its budget reduced in the financial year 2014/15 and early indications suggest further cuts are likely 2015/16. All activities we undertake in respect of anti-social behaviour and those who commit this crime reduce the budget we have available to target other crimes.

This type of behaviour is known to have a detrimental effect on the community in general. They elevate the fear of crime within the area, increase the fear of strangers. It is also well known that the fear of crime and anti-social behaviour can be as debilitating as the crime itself and is a powerful stimulus in changing people's behaviour and life styles. This type of behaviour has a significant and sometimes disproportionate impact on aspects of the wider community and it is not age, gender, sex, faith or religion specific.

It also impacts on businesses who are struggling to make ends meet in this period of austerity and lack of economic growth.

They are experiencing anti-social behaviour, drunkenness, gas sniffing outside their business premises this in turn is driving the customers away from their shops.

I fully support any additional activity or the use of any other legislation or power that assist us in preventing and reducing the fear of crime created by these few suspects. The use of intelligence and other sources of information, will ensure the use of anti-social behaviour orders are accurate and a proportionate response to a real and serious threat to community safety and confidence.
