Councillor Stephen Alambritis

Mr Mayor, Deputy Lieutenant, Councillors, Colleagues, officers, guests it gives me the utmost of pleasure to nominate Councillor Henry to be the first citizen of this great Borough of ours. To be our mayor for this next municipal year. To chair our meetings, to keep us united and together and at times apart. To represent us in the community, to raise funds for worthy causes and to do as Carl says.

Mr Mayor Councillor Joan Palmetta Henry was born in Jamaica into a family of 10 children and many are here tonight.

Times were tough then in Jamaica; aged just seven Joan would regularly make the four mile journey to school on foot there and back.

Politics featured in the family for Joan at a very early age with grandparents who ran a sugar plantation. Their grandmother Imogen was always fighting for the rights for working farmers to own the land. Imogen would take young Joan with her to the political rallies in the town square sit her down in the front row, where she could listen watch and learn how to lobby the rights of workers.

Joan's parents emigrated to England in 1959 settling in nearby Tooting leaving her in the care of her grandparents and more politics. At the age of 27 Joan decided to herself emigrate to England with her three children joining her parents in Tooting. Joan then attended South Thames College and Queen Marys in Putney and undertook an access course in nursing. While a nurse at both and St Georges Hospital, Joan became a special constable. As a special constable and in 1996, Joan covered every shift from 6 in the morning until 8pm at night at the Wimbledon championships when it famously that year rained for every day of play during that tournament but very soon she will be undercover at the tennis championships in the royal box; karma indeed.

Joan did over 10 years as a special constable and received a commendation for her long service from the then brilliant Home Secretary Jackie Smith. In 1990 Joan bought her own house for her family in Mitcham and has been there ever since and quickly started volunteering for Merton Victims Support and Marie Curie and many many other organisations. Her volunteer efforts included a long walk from Charing Cross in Central London to Canterbury Cathedral raising over £3000 for homeless people.

Between 2003 and 2011 Joan was a foster parent to 16 children many of the children have gone on to university and have had great careers. It is a testament to the fondness the foster children have for Joan that I can confirm tonight that they still keep in touch with her to this day.

In 2012 Joan met Siobhain McDonagh, another excellent MP and local Councillor Brenda Fraser. They spoke about the work of the Council and the rest is history as they say.

Joan was duly elected as Councillor in the ward of Pollards Hill in 2014, 2018 and just recently completed her hattrick of wins in the local elections this month. Now when I was Leader of the Council, Joan would always make a point of inviting me to

events to mark Black History Month in Pollards Hill ward and I know Councillor Whelton when seconding Joan will touch more on Councillor Henry's work.

Joan has been an avid committee member here in the council and has been a member of the following committees; Councillor Henry has been on Licensing, Standards and General Purposes Committee, Planning, Children and Young People, Sustainable Communities, Healthier Communities and Older People Panels, Joint Consultative Committee and those lively committees being the Cemetery Board and the Crematorium Board.

Joan has in the very recent past been Chair of the Labour group, probably the best Chairing experience one can get.

Mr Mayor, Deputy Lieutenant, Councillors, Colleagues, Officers, Guests, it is not a probability but a certainty that we will be served well by Councillor Joan Palmetta Henry; I therefore so nominate thank you very much.

Councillor Martin Whelton

Thank you Mr Mayor, I would like to second the nomination of Councillor Joan Henry to be the 58th Mayor of the London Borough of Merton. As a colleague of Joan's since 2014 and a Pollards Hill Councillor since 2002 it is a great privilege for the ward to have the next mayor. I am delighted and privileged to be before you, as the Mayor, the First Citizen of the London Borough of Merton for the year 2022 to 2023. To outgoing Mayor Councillor Mike Brunt I thank you for your guidance and congratulate you on an outstanding year.

It has been a journey to be now holding this great office, and to be able to represent our wonderful borough of Merton, and I look forward to engaging with the local community.

Coming from the beautiful island of Jamaica, I arrived in the UK **43** years ago with my 3 children. I first lived in Wandsworth with my parents and siblings before moving to Merton 32 years ago.

My grandparents, parents and siblings have always been in one way or another serving the community and giving back.

In closing, I promise that I will value the huge responsibility I have taken on and work together with my deputy and our consorts to represent our wonderful, beautiful and vibrant borough of Merton and those who live and work here.

Madame Mayor, Welcome. First of all it's wonderful to be addressing you by that title. Well Madame Mayor, I'm glad to have the privilege of moving the vote of thanks for my friend Councillor Mike Brunt. So I request the Council reports in its written record its sincere thanks and appreciation for Councillor Michael Brunt for the dedicated manner in which he has served as a Mayor of the London Borough of Merton in the year 2021 to 2022.

Councillor Brunt was elected to the council in 1990 and served as a councillor for 18 of the last 32 years. He was elected mayor at a virtual meeting in April 2021, taking over duties from Lower Morden Ward Councillor Sally Kenny. He started his official duties on the 9th of May. Councillor Brunt most recently represented Figges Marsh Ward as former leader of Merton Council and former Cabinet Member for the Environment.

Two of his grandparents were born in the borough in the and his parents lived all their lives in the borough. Councillor Brunt was also born in Merton and grew up here. Councillor Brunt developed a passion for healthcare during six years working for the Donald Woods foundation and HIV Charities in South Africa. As he helped lead Merton out of the Covid-19 pandemic, his theme for the year was focused on healthcare and wellbeing. Councillor Brunt selected Christian Care Association as the first of his nominated charities. The association provides emotional support and practical help in their home for struggling families. The second charity is Marie Curie, the UK's leading cancer charity, Marie curie provides frontline nursing, hospice care as well as a free support line for those coping with a terminal diagnosis. Councillor Brunt helped raise more than £58,000 for his chosen charities His highlights include the sleep out for 60 people at AFC Wimbledon in November, could have organsied that in the summer, but it had to be in November. And a raffle organised by Councillor Brunt aised £44,000 pounds for local charities. He also organized a charity cricket match for the Mayor's XI against the team from Richmond Cricket Club, which was played on reportedly the oldest pitch in the country. For some reason the formal report neglected to mention the final score and as one of the players, I can't for the life of me think why this was omitted from the formal facts

Councillor Brunt then hosted teas and tours at the All England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club, the venue for the first Mayor's Ball since 2019. Councillor Brunt presented Freedom of the Borough to Dickie Guy at AFC Wimbledon's ground. As a season ticket holder Councillor Brunt was privileged to watch their side play their first full season back in the borough and he was also delighted welcome the London Broncos to Merton.

Councillor Brunt hosted an afternoon tea at Tooting and Mitcham Hub in recognition of Silver Sunday - a celebration of older people, and combat issues such as social isolation.

Madame Mayor, aside from his charity work, Councillor Brunt led tribute to the fallen servicemen and servicewomen on Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday and he led citizenship ceremonies throughout the year the year as part of his civic duties.

With a focus on promoting community spirit as Merton recovered from the pandemic, Councillor Brunt championed testing and vaccination and visited more than half the schools in the borough, to highlight how Merton could be a more positive example.

Councillor Brunt's joint chaplains from the Merton Priory Team and the Mayor has been supported throughout by his consort, his mother, Joan Brunt and by the Deputy Mayor, Councillor Edith Macauley MBE.

Madame Mayor. Councillor Brunt's mayoralty will be remembered by the way in which he prioritised health, wellbeing and engaged with young people in Merton schools.

Merton runs through Councillor Brunt to his core and he's extremely passionate about safeguarding the borough's future. Through his charity work and civic duties he encaptured the borough's strong collective spirit and has been especially impressed by the way the community has come together over the year as Merton recovered from the pandemic. On behalf of the Merton Park Independent Residents, I am pleased to contribute to the vote of thanks to the retiring mayor, Councillor Mike Brunt. i've often found it interesting how much will you discover about someone in the year of office than you knew before. I'd been on the Children and Young Peoples Scrutiny Panel with Mike and chatted with him at various functions and events. I knew he had been a teacher, I did not know about his time at British Airways, nor how when he left BA that he took some time out to work in an orphanage in South Africa. Having helped organize a charity cricket match when I was Deputy Mayor, I was pleased to be asked again last year. Having come second to Richmond Cricket Club, the first time I played, I had prepared myself for a similar outcome. It was not to be, we had some different councillors playing this time, and a couple of external players as well. Mike batted early, maintaining he had not played for many years however he put on a very good performance and even managed to score a four a memorable accomplishment especially as mentioned it's the oldest cricket club in the country. I'm also pleased to say we came first that year and i just looked at the score, we were chasing 160 runs over 20 overs and at the end of the 90 we managed to get 162 so came first.

Another special visit was his mother's school, Wimbledon Park Primary

The Queen, God bless her is represented by the mace before us, but it is our residents, some behind me, that we owe a more immediate fealty. Councillor Brunt, together with Janice, I had the immense pleasure in supporting a good knock at Civic events. I know Janice took immense pride in being able to contribute in any way to the organisation that you and your team put into them. We know that Merton Council offers a fantastic support to the office of Mayor. Support that many others cannot provide. That Councillor Brunt the driving force, with your own energy and enthusiasm for fund raising for your chosen charities Christian Care and Marie Curie gave us many opportunities to support you. The Mayor's XI cricket match in Mitcham where your team was victorious was a great start to the year due of course to a significant innings, your own.

This was followed by a dinner and of the year of course topped off by a ball at the All England Club. As a point of interest Janice and I did do quite well at some of the raffles. Councillor Brunt, you visited all schools in Merton and gave so many children in insight to the role of a civic mayor and the london borough and amongst those children i am sure there will be future councillors now in the making. I'm sure that your mayoral year will be so well remembered for all you have done for the community of Merton and it is heartening to know that you remain among us. You're a good councillor and above all a genuinely good man. Thank you.

I remember when I was first elected to the council the lights you'll get used to over here it's green for four minutes and it goes to amber for the fourth, and it goes red at five I used to admire the people speaking at five minutes. I soon came to realise that the ones to admire were the ones that managed to finish before the amber light came on. Youv'e got me know, so I'm going to carry on.

Thank you to those who were councillors last year for putting your trust in me and thank you to all of those who've supported me throughout the year either directly or indirectly. Thank you for those who attended fundraising events or donated prizes or cash, sponsored the Deputy Mayor's swim which has been mentioned raised at least £3000, for my Movember fundraising and for the big sleepout which did raise money for the Dons Local Action Group and for Faith in Action as well as Tooting Community Venture.

I'll start with thanking my mum for agreeing to be Mayoress, at 93 years old I think she's done remarkably well. Thank you mum. To Terry, who can't be here, for encouraging me and always giving me sound advice and ensuring I keep my feet on the ground despite what can happen to Mayors. To Edith for being my deputy, Edith has been a constant support throughout the year and supported every fundraising event as well as her £3000 for the sponsored swim. I don't think that I could have done it without your support, so thank you very much for that. You have been so dedicated and been good at giving me quiet advice in the background, putting me right before I've gone wrong, so thank you. I know that Carmel can't be here but I know he's been a support to you, even though he's not been able to attend many things because he's in his first year at university and university students have other things to do. Thank you to my joint chaplains this year. IT's been really good to have you being part of this whole journey with me. Thank you to the Deputy Lieutenant for your support and your wisdom and I look forward to our lasting friendship. Thank you to Mayor's Office, to Sandra, Carl, Steve, Mick and of course Sharon. Sandra has been a wise adviser and incredible support. And I learnt early on, as you'll learn Madame Mayor, that you lose your name for the year. I did say to Sandra early on, in the first week I think, when it's just us, please call me Mike or Michael and she said yes Mr Mayor. That's the way it works. Carl Steve and Mick, as I mentioned before for your patience with my back seat driving, sometimes we

would get to a junction and I would say shouldn't we go that way? But no, they always knew better than either I or the sat nav. To Sharon for keeping the Mayor's parlour so spick and span and for your invariably shiny and smiling personality. For the rest of the team who do so much behind the scenes at many events, Diane, Amy, Andrew and others. To Jane and your team, you do incredible work for those in need in Merton and the effects are lasting. To Sharifa and all those in Marie Curie Care. Through the support we received I got to know what you do and how valuable that is. Thank you to the All England Tennis Club for all your hospitality and your generosity, they always make a strong contribution to the Mayor's charities. But especially for making mum feel so welcome and so welcome and special in the royal box. That was a really special. If you ask her afterwards she will say that that's the highlight of the year. To the team at Wimbledon Theatre also contributed, particularly during the pantomime, where Shane Ritchie, who is my other best friend. kept announcing at the end of every performance that the staff would be collecting for the charities with buckets. £11,5000 was raised there. To the team at the registry office who've been encouraging and made me feel so welcome all the time, as we mentioned over 70 ceremonies, and that's been a great privilege to do that. To all those involved in rolling out the vaccine in Merton. I've been able to visit and have vaccines publicly several times i went to thank them this afternoon and they said, do you want your second booster now while you're here? And that's why I'm wearing this, I have the second booster up until next year.

To Hannah Doody and Louise Round, your advice and support, particularly during the hybrid meetings and helping me to get through those. Fellow counsellors, for never making me have to stand up. I appreciate that, you've always conducted the meetings, with a bit of chastising and good humour so I do thank you for that. Merton/Morden Guild, for being a constant support, working behind the scenes on things like Silver Sunday and the cricket match. To Janice, Sally Oonagh, Ed, Linda, as former mayors and members of the committee on the fundraising you've been invaluable. You've given me steadfast support and advised me on the role of Mayor and it's been great to know that as you've gone before me, that you can advise. So thank you to those that I've mentioned and to all former Mayors who still sit on the Council because I know i know that you have that experience.

I'll briefly mention some highlights of the year and I've already mentioned the tennis so I won't go into that. Edith and I went to the schools and that was very special and particularly last week, one of the highlights a three-year-old girl in the nursery came up to me because I always used to go into the schools in robes. Madame Mayor you can do that in the future. But this three year old girl came to me and said, where's your dressing up box? And I said, I haven't got it with me, and she took me by the hand and took me to the dressing up corner in the nursery and that was a precious moment and I realised just how confident our young people are in this borough, and we have a fantastic education system and I think we should encourage all councillors in their wards to get to know the schools, particularly the primary schools, be in there and get to know them.

The Silver Sunday was a highlight, and that's already been mentioned as well. The rising stars football team, Pollards Hill, was a fantastic event - one of the first public

events I went to after we came out of Covid. And that is a team that has been brought together by the PCSO in that area and these are young men who would not necessarily be doing good things but they were all on track and they support each other and they're going on to support each other and making lives in football but also in other areas as well. A big highlight was standing in the semi-circle giving Dickie Guy his freedom of the borough and also having him here in the Council Chamber. And showing I really have been a supporter since 1977 by giving him the first programme I ever bought which he was on and that was in January 1977.

Tooting Mitcham for Teenagers, those not in education, not in training, seeing how things work there is incredible, these are young people who would not necessarily achieve because they're not in school for educational training for all sorts of reasons. But I met some youngsters who are going on to apprenticeships and degree and going to university, phenomenal work.

The celebration of music with Merton Music Foundation Christmas concert was amazing and then following on from that 1001 nights at king's college school but it included children from local primaries and most of the secondary schools. I don't think it was a dry eye in the house when the boy sang supercalifragilistic expialidocious.

The Garden Party was a special one as well, I think that was mum's second highlight of the year and we discovered the advantage of having a wheelchair because the wheelchair users were lined up in a line next to the palace and the royal party shook hands with all of them. So mum met the future king and also Princess Anne who is one of her heroes. I'll stop there because I could take up the whole evening, but I'll say in conclusion that being Mayor has been a humbling experience. I felt that i've learned a lot during the year and I'll be ever thankful for that. I learned a lot about myself as well. Merton is a wonderful, vibrant, diverse borough, that is full of talent, hope and respect I hope that all 57 of us live up to the expectations of the residents we are here to serve. And there is just one small anecdote. In the 98 elections at the count, I had a Liberal Democrat in a rosette come up to me at the count, and said you won't remember me, but I've just voted for you, I voted two liberal and you. You may remember, because I was 9 years old, I came to see you in your first surgery he didn't know it was my first surgery, but it was my first surgery - because there was broken glass on the tennis courts. I reported that to the director that was cleared and he remembered that. I think we should all remember that we're here partly because our party but also here because of the respect we show our residents and the dedication to each other. A number of children at schools ask what it's like to be mayor and whether I'll miss it when it ends. My answer has always been, that it's such a special experience that it needs to be shared. I often say to them that it's a bit like being Dr Who – the robes are the TARDIS but the person wearing it changes each year. And I'll finish off by saying there's an expression that I'd learnt during my time in South Africa, which was "things happen when the time is full", and I think the time is full, so thank you.
