A. That the Panel comment on the accessibility audits for Croydon and Wandsworth Personal Independent Payment Assessment Centres.

1 PURPOSE OF REPORT AND EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1. This Panel has on-going concerns about difficulties Merton residents face when applying for the personal independent payment allowance. At the last meeting of the Panel, councillors asked the scrutiny team to assist Merton Centre for Independent Living in conducting an audit of assessment centres. The audits are attached.

2 DETAILS

- 2.1. The Personal Independence Payment (PIP) is a benefit that helps with the extra costs of a long-term health condition or disability for people aged 16 to 64. It's gradually replacing Disability Living Allowance. This Panel has taken an active interest in addressing concerns about the roll-out of PIP.
- 2.2. There are no assessment centres located within the Borough and the nearest centres for Merton residents are in Croydon and Wandsworth.
- 2.3. This Panel have previously been informed that there are some accessibility problems and the attached audits provide an overview of the main provisions at the centres.
- 2.4. Following the visit to the Croydon assessment centre, it was reported that a new site has been found in Croydon and will open in March 2019. This centre will include all ground floor assessment rooms. The current Croydon Centre will remain open to provide an extra facility when there is a high demand.

3 ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS

The Healthier Communities and Older People Overview and Scrutiny Panel can select topics for scrutiny review and for other scrutiny work as it sees fit, taking into account views and suggestions from officers, partner organisations and the public.
